



## Italy in Lombard Age: funerary archeology, material culture and production centres.

The aim of the course is learning about Lombard Italy through the lens of archaeology, analysing it in its main characters: male and female fashions, the ritual of death, trade, and production centres of Early Middle Ages. Students will learn to recognize some specific archaeological finds, mainly from burials, and main decorative styles of this period. The course is aimed at all students and no specific prerequisites are required.



## Elite burials in the Italian peninsula in Early Middle Age: strategies of distinction and Christianizing processes.

The aim of the course is to analyse funerary rituals of early medieval elite in Italy and their strategies of self-representation, starting from the most important kings's and queens's burials of Western Europe and the fashion of the Byzantium imperial court. The course will wind through some of the main Italian cities, such as Rome, seat of Popes, and Pavia, seat of the Lombard court, passing through the countryside, where elite had built beautiful cloisters, some still existing. The course is aimed at all students and no specific prerequisites are required.
