This evolution is significantly shortening the period during which a particular job skill remains relevant, making continuous learning a necessity. The concept of a lifelong career in a single job is becoming increasingly outdated.

Education systems worldwide are facing the urgent need to adapt to these changes. It's essential to recognize that the skills which will be in demand in the future will be very different from those in traditional education. This shift requires a dual approach: changing what is taught and how it is taught.

In today's dynamic world, education at all levels needs to evolve to give students the skills necessary for future success. For instance, many of the jobs that current students will do in the future don't even exist today. According to LinkedIn, the next five years could see the creation of approximately 150 million new technology-related jobs. In its 'Jobs on the Rise' report, LinkedIn also highlights the increasing reality of remote working in these roles.

The World Economic Forum, in its 'Schools of the Future' paper, identifies crucial skills for future success. These include technological skills like data science and programming, interpersonal skills like emotional intelligence and empathy, and 'soft' skills such as creativity and effective communication. As automation and AI continue to evolve, human-centric skills will become increasingly valuable.

Moreover, ethics and cultural diversity are becoming more important. For example, the role of an AI ethicist is emerging as a significant career path, reflecting the need for ethical control of AI in various sectors. The increase in hiring workplace

diversity experts, which saw a 64% rise in 2020, indicates the growing importance of diversity in the professional world.

The traditional educational model, established during the first industrial revolution, has seen little fundamental change over the years. Students typically still learn by listening to a teacher at the front of a classroom. However, this method needs to evolve to better prepare students for the 21st century.

The role of teachers is shifting from being the primary source of information to facilitators of learning. A practical example of such educational shift can be seen at South Tapiola High School (ETIS) in Finland. Known for its high educational standards, ETIS integrates skill development like collaboration, entrepreneurship, and social awareness into its curriculum. Programs like the Young Entrepreneurship Program and the European Parliament for Young People Program are examples of its innovative approach. These initiatives not only develop real-world skills but also ensure that students excel in traditional subjects, as can be seen by their performance exceeding national averages in subjects like math and chemistry.

The transformation of both the content and methods of teaching is a giant task, but it is essential to align education with the always-changing needs of the 21st-century world. These changes in education reflect bigger changes across various industries, highlighting a future where adaptability, technology, and innovative thinking are critical.
